Employing a Multivariate Vector Autoregressive (VAR) and Vector Error Correction (VEC) framework with data spanning 1990–2023, the chapter unravels the dynamic interplay between natural resource rents, financial development, institutional quality, and environmental sustainability. Findings reveal that mineral revenue shocks generate profound short- and long-term effects where extractive wealth temporarily fuels fiscal expansion, yet weak governance exacerbates financial misallocation and environmental degradation. Granger causality analyses uncover a bidirectional relationship between financial deepening and ecological decline, highlighting the perils of unregulated financial growth. Crucially, the study demonstrates that Ghana's resource-curse trap is not inevitable; embedding green financial instruments, adaptive fiscal governance, and transparent institutional practices can transform volatile resource rents into inclusive, resilient growth.

Transitioning from national finance to global investment, Chapter Three, *Beyond the Numbers: Unpacking China's Investment Footprint in Africa – The Case of Ghana* by Gideon Azumah, situates foreign capital within Africa's broader structural transformation. Moving decisively beyond narrow statistical interpretations, the authors explore agriculture, education, trade, health, and peace as pillars of Africa's renewal, emphasizing indigenous innovation and structural adaptation, while linking foreign investment to institutional capacity-building.
